Names for:	What kind of family life do I have? My parents mate for life and we live together in large flocks of 50 - 100. We do not migrate but spend our life close to the same area in which we are hatched.		
Adult male- Cock Adult female-Hen Young- Chicks Group:- Flocks	What do I eat and when do I eat? In the wild, Rose-ringed Parakeets usually feed on buds, fruits, vegetables, nuts, berries and seeds. Wild flocks also fly several miles to forage in farmlands and orchards causing extensive damage		
	Who are my predators? Trapping pressure to cater to the demands of the pet trade have caused a drastic decline in this species.
