I am hatched from an egg. My mother lays About 25 eggs at a time. When I am first hatched I am between 2 1/2 and 4 inches long.

How long does it take me to grow up and how long do I live?

In my first year I can double my weight. The oldest recorded Savanna Monitor is 11 years old. Other monitors have lived as long as 15 years.
